Foreword from the Chair

This is a record of the Institute's third year. Our purpose has not changed: to produce careful, independent research that policymakers, business and the public can rely on, and to publish it openly with the data and methods behind it.

Independence is easier to declare than to protect. This review therefore accounts not only for what we published, but for how we were funded, how commissioned work was kept separate from our published analysis, and how our editorial standards were applied. Where we fell short, we say so; where we corrected the record, it is logged in our corrections register.

The year in review

The third-year review sets out how the Institute matured its editorial standards, established its corrections process and published its first data catalogue. It reports on the year's research, the reach of that work among policymakers, business and the press, and the funding that supported it.

Highlights

- Twenty-two publications across seven research areas.
- First public data catalogue released under open licences.
- Editorial standards and corrections policy formally adopted.
- Comparative studies presented at eight public briefings.

Research programme

Our work spans nine research areas — governance and institutions; markets and industry; technology and society; climate and energy; health systems; education and skills; trade and development; security and resilience; and labour and inequality. Each published output carries a plain-language summary, a methods note and, wherever possible, an open dataset. Commissioned market research is conducted under a separate engagement model and is never used to shape our published, non-partisan analysis.

In 2023 the programme employed 34 researchers and professional staff and hosted 3 research fellows, with fieldwork and data partnerships spanning 24 countries.

Independence and editorial standards

Every flagship report and working paper was externally peer reviewed before publication. Funding for each published output is disclosed in the funding register, and no funder holds the right to review, amend or suppress findings prior to release. Our corrections policy commits us to correct significant errors promptly and transparently.

Funding and finances

Total income for the year was £3.3m, against expenditure of £3.2m. The Institute holds free reserves of £1.1m, in line with our reserves policy of maintaining between three and six months of operating costs.

Governance

The Institute is directed by a Board of Trustees, supported by an Advisory Council that reviews methodology and research ethics. Trustees serve in a personal capacity and receive no remuneration for their role. Registers of interests are maintained for trustees, the executive team and senior researchers, and are reviewed annually.

Looking ahead

We enter the coming year with the same commitment: to widen access to our data, to strengthen the independence of our review processes, and to make our research more useful to the people who must act on it. We are grateful to our funders, partners and staff for making the year's work possible.
